

**ANTI-MONEY LAUNDERING AND OTHER
FINANCIAL CRIME (MISCELLANEOUS
AMENDMENTS) BILL 2018**

Explanatory Memorandum

1. This Bill is promoted by Miss Bettison M.H.K.
2. *Part 1 - Clauses 1 and 2* deal with the short title of the resulting Act (“the Act”) and its commencement.
3. *Part 2 - Clauses 3 and 4* provide that certain provisions (relating to systems, procedures, record-keeping, controls and training) of a code made by the Department of Home Affairs relating to money laundering under section 157 of the Proceeds of Crime Act 2008 and relating to the financing of proliferation and terrorism under section 68 of the Terrorism and Other Crime (Financial Restrictions) Act 2014 may be imposed upon a trustee who is resident in the Island but who is not carrying on business in the regulated sector, and a foreign trustee.
4. *Part 3 – Clause 5* amends the Criminal Justice Act 1991 by inserting a new Part 2A (jurisdiction in relation to certain offences) comprising new sections 26ZA to 26ZH. The Part is derived from Part 1 of the Criminal Justice Act 1993 (Parliament).
5. New section 26ZA specifies the offences to which the Part applies and divides the offences into Group A (the substantive offences) and Group B (conspiracy, attempt and incitement to commit a Group A offence and conspiracy to defraud).
6. New section 26ZB defines what is meant by “relevant event” and specifies that, for a Group A offence, where an event took place is to be disregarded and a person may be guilty of a Group A offence if any of the events which are “relevant events” in relation to an offence, took place in the Island.
7. New section 26ZC specifies certain matters that are immaterial to jurisdiction, including whether or not the person was a British citizen or was in the Island at certain times.
8. New section 26ZD makes rules for determining when property is obtained in the Island and a communication is made in the Island.
9. New section 26ZE deals with attempts to commit an offence and states that, where a person does an act to which the section applies, the offence shall be treated as the offence of attempting to commit the relevant Group A offence.

10. New section 26ZF specifies the circumstances in which a person may be guilty of conspiracy to defraud or of incitement to commit a Group A offence.
11. New section 26ZG makes provision about the relevance of external law in relation to the offences to which new Part 2A applies and states that a person is guilty of an offence under new section 26ZF(1) if the act or omission would constitute an offence under the law in force where the act or omission was intended to take place. In relation to attempt and incitement, the person is guilty only if what that person had in view would involve the commission of an offence under the law in force where the activity was intended to take place. The section also sets out certain procedural matters where the defence considers that either condition has not been satisfied.
12. New section 26ZH states that new Part 2A does not apply to anything done before the relevant provision of that Part comes into operation.
13. *Clause 6* repeals sections 13 (conspiracy to commit fraud outside the Island) and 15 (offences committed outside the Island) of the Fraud Act 2017, as a result of the inclusion of the wider Part 2A provisions provided for in clause 5.
14. *Part 4 – Clauses 7 to 9* amend the penalties for offences of failing to disclose information in paragraph 1(6) of Schedule 6 to the Anti-Terrorism and Crime Act 2003, section 20(5) of the Financial Intelligence Unit Act 2016 and sections 163A and 176 of the Proceeds of Crime Act 2008, to bring the penalties in line with section 41(1) of the Financial Services Act 2008.
15. *Part 5 – Clause 10* amends the Gambling (Amendment) Act 2006 so as to alter a cross-reference within section 8(1) of that Act which relates to matters which may be stayed pending appeal and, in Schedule 4, to add a category of decision which is subject to appeal.
16. *Part 6 – Clause 11* amends the Foundations Act 2011 so as to require a copy of the foundation rules to be provided to the Registrar (from which any information by which a person could be identified has been redacted) and to require the Registrar to make a copy of those rules available for public inspection. Section 41 of the Foundations Act 2011 is amended in relation to the documents to be kept at the foundation and section 45 is amended so as to widen its application to include foundation rules.
17. *Part 7 – Clauses 12 to 16* amend the Partnership Act 1909, the Companies Act 1931, the Limited Liability Companies Act 1996, the Companies Act 2006 and the Foundations Act 2011, by inserting into each of those Acts a clause which clarifies that the Registrar (or Department, as the case may be) is not liable for the accuracy of the information submitted for inclusion on any register or index or for registration under those Acts and, despite that, to empower the Registrar (or Department, as the case may be), to make such enquiries as appropriate to establish the accuracy of any such information.
18. *Part 8 – Clause 17* amends paragraph 2(1)(ba) of Schedule 1 to the Financial Services Act 2008 so as to amend the persons in respect of whom the Isle of Man Financial Services Authority may conduct an investigation into any potential

liability arising from breach of AML/CFT legislation and *clause 18* amends paragraph 6(1) of Schedule 5 to the Insurance Act 2008, so as to provide that the Authority's powers under paragraphs 1 to 4 of that Schedule may be exercised for the purpose of an investigation referred to in clause 17.

19. The resulting Act is not expected to have any financial or human resource implications.
20. In the opinion of the member moving the Bill, its provisions are compatible with the Convention rights within the meaning of the Human Rights Act 2001.

1 **A BILL** to amend the Anti-Terrorism and Crime Act 2003, the Proceeds of
2 Crime Act 2008, the Terrorism and Other Crime (Financial Restrictions) Act
3 2014 and the Financial Intelligence Unit Act 2016, to amend certain record-
4 keeping provisions of the Foundations Act 2011, to amend the Companies Act
5 1931, the Companies Act 2006, the Foundations Act 2011, the Limited Liability
6 Companies Act 1996 and the Partnership Act 1909 in order to provide powers to
7 make enquiries in respect of information to be registered, in accordance with
8 recommendations specified in the Fifth Round Mutual Evaluation Report of the
9 Committee of Experts on the Evaluation of Anti-Money Laundering Measures
10 and the Financing of Terrorism; to amend the Criminal Justice Act 1991 to make
11 provision for the jurisdiction of courts in the Island in relation to certain
12 criminal offences; to amend the Gambling (Amendment) Act 2006 to add to the
13 decisions that may be appealed under Schedule 4 to that Act and to amend the
14 matters in respect of which there may be a stay pending an appeal; to amend
15 Schedule 1 to the Financial Services Act 2008 in relation to the persons in
16 respect of which an AML/CFT investigation may be conducted and Schedule 5
17 to the Insurance Act 2008 so as to apply certain powers available under it to
18 such investigations; and for connected purposes.

BE IT ENACTED by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Council and Keys in Tynwald assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

19 **PART 1 – INTRODUCTORY**

20 **1 Short title**

21 The short title of this Act is the Anti-Money Laundering and Other Financial
22 Crime (Miscellaneous Amendments) Act 2018.

1 **2 Commencement**

2 (1) This Act (other than section 1 and this section) comes into operation on
3 such day or days as the Department of Home Affairs may by order
4 appoint.

5 Tynwald procedure — laying only.

6 (2) An order under subsection (1) may include such consequential,
7 incidental, supplementary, transitional and transitory provision as the
8 Department of Home Affairs considers necessary or expedient.

9 **PART 2 – CODES RELATING TO MONEY LAUNDERING AND**
10 **THE FINANCING OF PROLIFERATION AND TERRORISM**

11 **3 Proceeds of Crime Act 2008 amended**

12 After section 157(2) of the *Proceeds of Crime Act 2008* (money laundering codes),
13 insert —

14 | “(2A) Additionally and without limiting subsection (2), a code may —
15 | (a) impose any of the requirements specified in subsection
16 | (2)(b) or (c) on a person to whom subsection (2B) applies;
17 | and
18 | (b) provide that a reference in it to an enactment or to a public
19 | document made under an enactment is to be construed as a
20 | reference to the enactment or the public document as
21 | amended from time to time.

22 | (2B) This subsection applies to a trustee who is —
23 | (a) resident in the Island and is not carrying on business in the
24 | regulated sector or employed in or otherwise concerned in

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- (b) provide that a reference in it to an enactment or to a public document made under an enactment is to be construed as a reference to the enactment or the public document as amended from time to time.
- (2B) This subsection applies to a trustee who is –
 - (a) resident in the Island and is not carrying on business in the regulated sector or employed in or otherwise concerned in such a business; and
 - (b) a foreign trustee.
 - (2C) In this section, “foreign trustee” means a person who is not resident in the Island but is a trustee of a trust which is governed by the law of the Island.”.

20 **OFFENCES**

21 **26ZA Offences to which this Part applies**

22 P1993/36/1 and drafting

- 23 (1) This Part applies to 2 groups of offences –
 - 24 (a) any offence mentioned in subsection (2) (a "Group A
 - 25 offence"); and
 - 26 (b) any offence mentioned in subsection (3) (a "Group B
 - 27 offence").
- 28 (2) The Group A offences are –
 - 29 (a) an offence under any of the following provisions of the
 - 30 *Theft Act 1981* –
 - 31 (i) section 7 (theft);
 - 32 (ii) section 19 (false accounting);

- 32 (1) Subject to subsection (2), for the purposes of this Part “relevant
- 33 event”, in relation to any Group A offence, means any act or
- 34 omission or other event (including any result of one or more acts
- 35 or omissions) proof of which is required for conviction of the
- 36 offence.
- 37 (2) In relation to an offence under section 3 of the *Fraud Act 2017*
- 38 (fraud), “relevant event” includes –

1 (a) if the fraud involved an intention to make a gain and the
2 gain occurred, that occurrence;

3 (b) if the fraud involved an intention to cause a loss or to
4 expose another to a risk of loss and the loss occurred, that

15 (1) A person may be guilty of a Group A or Group B offence whether
16 or not that person was —

17 (a) a British citizen at any material time;

18 (b) in the Island at any such time.

19 (2) On a charge of conspiracy to commit a Group A offence, or on a
20 charge of conspiracy to defraud in the Island, the defendant may
21 be guilty of the offence whether or not —

22 (a) the defendant became a party to the conspiracy in the
23 Island;

24 (b) any act or omission or other event in relation to the
25 conspiracy occurred in the Island.

26 (3) On a charge of attempting to commit a Group A offence, the
27 defendant may be guilty of the offence whether or not —

28 (a) the attempt was made in the Island;

29 (b) it had an effect in the Island.

38 **26ZD Rules for determining certain jurisdictional questions relating to**

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location of events

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P1993/36/4 and drafting

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In relation to a Group A or Group B offence —

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(a) there is an obtaining of property in the Island if the property is either despatched from or received at a place in the Island; and

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(b) there is a communication in the Island of any information, instruction, request, demand or other matter if it is sent by any means —

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(i) from a place in the Island to a place elsewhere; or

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(ii) from a place elsewhere to a place in the Island.

26ZE Attempt

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P1981/47/1A and drafting

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(1) If this section applies to an act, what the person doing the act had in view shall be treated as an offence to which section 9 of the *Criminal Law Act 1981* applies.

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(2) This section applies to an act if —

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(a) it is done in the Island; and

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(b) it would fall within section 9 of the *Criminal Law Act 1981* as more than merely preparatory to the commission of a Group A offence but for the fact that that offence, if completed, would not be an offence triable in the Island.

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(3) Subsection (1) above is subject to section 26ZG (relevance of external law).

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(4) Where a person does any act to which this section applies, the offence which he or she commits shall for all purposes be treated as the offence of attempting to commit the relevant Group A offence.

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26ZF Conspiracy and incitement

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P1993/36/5(3)-(5) and drafting

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(1) A person may be guilty of conspiracy to defraud if —

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(a) a party to the agreement constituting the conspiracy, or a party's agent, did anything in the Island in relation to the agreement before its formation;

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(b) a party to it became a party in the Island (by joining it either in person or through an agent); or

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(c) a party to it, or a party's agent, did or omitted anything in the Island in pursuance of it,

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1 and the conspiracy would be triable in the Island but for the fraud
2 which the parties to it had in view not being intended to take
3 place in the Island.

4 (2) A person may be guilty of incitement to commit a Group A
5 offence if the incitement —

6 (a) takes place in the Island; and

7 (b) would be triable in the Island but for what the person
8 charged had in view not being an offence triable in the
9 Island.

10 (3) Subsections (1) and (2) are subject to section 26ZG.

11 **26ZG Relevance of external law**

12 P1993/36/6 and drafting

13 (1) A person is guilty of an offence triable by virtue of section 26ZF(1)
14 only if the pursuit of the agreed course of conduct would at some
15 stage involve —

16 (a) an act or omission by one or more of the parties; or

17 (b) the happening of some other event,

18 constituting an offence under the law in force where the act,
19 omission or other event was intended to take place.

20 (2) A person is guilty of an offence triable by virtue of section 26ZE or
21 section 26ZF(2) only if what that person had in view would
22 involve the commission of an offence under the law in force
23 where the whole or any part of it was intended to take place.

24 (3) Conduct punishable under the law in force in any place is an
25 offence under that law for the purposes of this section, however it
26 is described in that law.

27 (4) Subject to subsection (6), a condition specified in subsection (1) or
28 (2) shall be taken to be satisfied unless, not later than specified by
29 the court, the defence serve on the prosecution a notice —

30 (a) stating that, on the facts as alleged with respect to the
31 relevant conduct, the condition is not in their opinion
32 satisfied;

33 (b) showing their grounds for that opinion; and

34 (c) requiring the prosecution to show that it is satisfied.

35 (5) In subsection (4) "the relevant conduct" means —

36 (a) where the condition in subsection (1) is in question, the
37 agreed course of conduct; and

38 (b) where the condition in subsection (2) is in question, what
39 the defendant had in view.

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(6) The court, if it thinks fit, may permit the defence to require the prosecution to show that the condition is satisfied without the prior service of a notice under subsection (4).

(7) In the Court of General Gaol Delivery the question whether the condition is satisfied shall be decided by the Deemster alone.

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26ZH Application of Part 2A

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Nothing in any provision of this Part applies to any act, omission or other event occurring before the commencement of that provision.”

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(3) In section 21 (evidence or information for use outside the Island), subsection (7) is repealed.

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(4) In section 21(9), paragraph (c) is repealed.

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6 Sections 13 and 15 Fraud Act 2017 repealed

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Sections 13 and 15 of the *Fraud Act 2017* are repealed.

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PART 4 – PENALTIES FOR FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH CERTAIN REQUIREMENTS

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7 Anti-Terrorism and Crime Act 2003 amended

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(1) The *Anti-Terrorism and Crime Act 2003* is amended in accordance with subsection (2).

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(2) In paragraph 1(6) of Schedule 6 (financial information), for “on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding £5,000”, substitute —

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(a) on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding level 5 on the standard scale or to custody for a term not exceeding 6 months, or to both;

(b) on conviction on information to a fine or to custody for a term not exceeding 2 years, or to both.”

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8 Financial Intelligence Unit Act 2016 amended

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(1) The *Financial Intelligence Unit Act 2016* is amended in accordance with subsection (2).

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(2) For section 20(5) (offence for failing to comply with request), substitute —

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“ (5) A person guilty of an offence under subsection (1), (3) or (4) is liable —

- 1 (a) on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding level 5 on
2 the standard scale or to custody for a term not exceeding 6
3 months, or to both;
4 (b) on conviction on information to a fine or to custody for a
5 term not exceeding 2 years, or to both.”.

6 **9 Proceeds of Crime Act 2008 amended**

7 (1) The *Proceeds of Crime Act 2008* is amended in accordance with subsections
8 (2) and (3).

9 (2) In section 163A (production orders: offences) —

11 (b) for subsection (4), substitute —

12 “(4) A person guilty of an offence under subsection (1) or (3) is

14 (a) on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding level 5 on

36 *Countering the Financing of Terrorism) Act 2018* (public statements)”.

13 Companies Act 1931 amended

In the *Companies Act 1931*, after section 285A, insert —

“285B Department not liable for accuracy of information submitted

- (1) To avoid doubt, the Department is not liable for the accuracy of any document submitted for inclusion on any register it maintains under this Act.

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- (2) Despite subsection (1), the Registrar may make such enquiries as he or she considers appropriate in the circumstances to establish the accuracy of any such information.”.

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16 Foundations Act 2011 amended

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In the *Foundations Act 2011*, after section 50, insert —

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“50A Registrar not liable for accuracy of information submitted

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- (1) To avoid doubt, the Registrar is not liable for the accuracy of any information submitted for inclusion on the register.

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- (2) Despite subsection (1), the Registrar may make such enquiries as he or she considers appropriate in the circumstances to establish the accuracy of any such information.”.

1991 to make provision for the jurisdiction of courts in the Island in relation to certain criminal offences; to amend the Gambling (Amendment) Act 2006 to add to the decisions that may be appealed under Schedule 4 to that Act and to amend the matters in respect of which there may be a stay pending an appeal; to amend Schedule 1 to the Financial Services Act 2008 in relation to the persons in respect of which an AML/CFT investigation may be conducted and Schedule 5 of the Insurance Act 2008 so as to apply certain powers available under it to such investigations; and for connected purposes.
